

Planning consent for the sale of 'hot take-away' food at this address was given on 4th October 1976, subject to the following conditions:-

- 1). The hot food shop hereby permitted shall not remain open for the sale of food after 23.00 hours on weekdays and shall not be open to the public at any time on Sundays.
- 2), The equipment, fume extraction system and external extraction duct shall be installed in accordance with a scheme as may be agreed with the local planning authority, or in default of agreement as shall be determined by the Secretary of State.

These conditions were imposed for the reasons that:'It is in the interests of the amenity of nearby residents'.

Condition (1) has not been observed and an Enforcement Notice was served by the City Solicitor on 11th August. This notice must be complied with by the 10th October.

The pollution caused by the noisy, badly-positioned-extractor unit and the unhygenic state of the yard at the rear of the shop is a problem for the Environmental Health Department. We have spoken to the Chief Environmental Health Officer - Mr. C.H. Rena, and his department are working on this.

We should like to thank our Councillors Mr. McVeigh and Mr. Hallows for their interest and help in this matter.

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Woolton Hall Inquiry.

This Public Inquiry started on August 2nd and lasted 4 days, and held by an Inspector from the Department of the Environment in 14 Sir Thomas STreet. On one side was the Notre Dame Trustee Company who wish to demolish the Hall and on the opposing side the City Planning Department who have twice before refused Listed Building consent to demolish on account of it being listed Grade I (one of only 8 in Liverpool) and of the architectural and historical importance of the building.

Miss Gnosspelius, who carried out the Inspection of the Fabric of Woolton Hall for the City Planning Department in 1972-3 was called by the City Council to speak as their 'expert witness', and the Woolton Society's case for conservation was presented by Mrs. Carmichael who founded the Society in 1972 when the first application to demolish was sought.

The Secretary, Mrs. Lewis, attended and submitted the Gateacre Society's objection to demolition. It was a most interesting and instructive four days, ending with a site visit by the Inspector and one or two 'interested parties'. The Secretary, who had never before been inside Woolton Hall felt very privileged to be one of the eight people present and enjoyed the tour of inspection enormously; this ranged over the whole building from the cellars to the roof - the view from which is magnificent.

We understand that the result of the Inquiry may not be know for six months.
