The type of meetings which members would like us to arrange was discussed and we are working on the suggestions offered - see Future Programme.

There was some discussion about problems in the Village, these seemed to be mostly about traffic and the amount of litter in our streets. We will be pressing the appropriate departments to take some action. Damage to the Prudential Building by tall vehicles turning into Sandfield Road is once again causing concern. We have written to the Planning Office about this and the Prudential Assurance Company has too; the Conservation Officer would find it helpful to know who the offenders are, so if you can let us know what type of vehicle causes this damage &/or the name of the firm concerned we will pass on the information.

On the 29th November the Rev. Victor Davies came to talk to us. The lecture was billed as a talk on Classical Architecture but it turned out to be about WHAT WE OWE TO THE NORMANS. He described vividly the way of life in the early settlements and how the first primitive castles were built - first the mott and bailey of earthworks and timber and later of stone. He told us that one was shown on the Bayeux Tapestry and he

According to the Domesday Book half the land was in the possession of the

where the Norman foundations were still to be seen.

CAROL SINGING ON THE GREEN. We had hoped to arrange an evening of Carol singing on the Village Green before Christmas, lead by children from the local schools. Unfortunately it was impossible to agree on a date which was suitable to everyone, but we feel the idea was a good one and will start earlier and hope for more success next year.

POLLUTION. The Woolton Society are concerned about pollution in their area and they have sent round a Questionnaire asking for information. If any members feel that they have this sort of problem please let us know and we will give them one of the forms to fill in.

CONSERVATION AREA. The extensions to the Conservation Area in Halewood Road and Belle Vale Road have been approved at last by the Regional office of the Department of the Environment in Manchester. Before long the people concerned should receive notification from the Planning Office. They are also working on some new leaflets designed to inform residents living in Conservation Areas what this means, and what they may and may not do to their property without Planning Consent.

THE PRACTICAL FUTURE FOR MERSEYSIDE. On the 5th November some members attended a stimulating Conference in Liverpool University's Department of Civic Design. There were several excellent speakers outlining our problems and ways in which our environment can be improved. We had an Exhibition of 'Rehabilitation in Gateacre' on display which attracted some interest.

NEWS FROM OTHER AMENITY SOCIETIES. We had an interesting letter from Mr. Michael Dent formerly of South Station Road and now living in Harefield, Middlesex. He had driven through Gateacre during the summer, noticed our Conservation Area Signs and written to the City Planning Officer asking to be put in touch with us. Mr. Dent is Chairman of the Advisory Panel for Harefield Conservation Area and he sent us their Annual Report and two leaflets which show that they have similar problems to us. Their Panel was set up by the Council and its members are nominated by local Associations and Societies. They consider planning applications, give the Council advice and make suggestions for future policy proposals; thus constituting (like the Gateacre Society) an important link in the process of public participation in decision-making which affects all aspects of life in a Conservation Area.
