## AERIAL ARCHAEOLOGY OF S.W. LANCASHIRE

A GLASGOW CHILDHOOD - On the 26th February Patricia McKinnon Day told us about her early life living with her grandmother in a tenement in Plantation Street, Glasgow. The idea for her research sprang from her conviction that a painter's work is influenced, to a greater or lesser extent, by what she saw around her and experienced as a child.

The year she researched was the Glasgow of 1962 (making some of feel very old !). She used newspapers, photographs, maps and the memories of people who had lived there at that time; in the local Records Office, wondering what had been there before the tenements, she found maps showing mansions with large gardens owned by wealthy merchants who had plantations in the West Indies.

She found that people lived in closely knit communities, going out and never locking their doors; there was little vandalism and in the streets were barrow boys, rag and bone men and lascars walking to the market in single file and all around was the decay of the shipyards - all very reminisent of a Liverpool we knew.

"All slums were tenements but not all tenements were slums" she was told and the one she lived in until she was 17 wasn't. We saw pictures of sandstone tenement blocks, some as long as a street, comprising many flats, as we would call them, but to the Scots they are houses. They had arched entrances to the stairs, cleaned by tenants on a weekly rota. There is a tradition in Scotland of living in flats as there is in Europe, quite unlike England. The flats had mostly 2 rooms, a kitchen with a bed recess and a bedroom and hers also had a lavatory with a lock on the door — a special place where there was privacy and books could be read and homework done. Some flats had their lavatories on the landing to be shared with others and, even worse, some were outside.

There was the same type of football rivalry that we are used to in Liverpool - Rangers, the protestant team, whose foundation was on the dockside and Celtic which was founded by a priest to get the boys off the streets. Houses had shrines to their hercesand religion played a large part in this male dominated community, churches were active and well attended.

The great demolition started in 1962 and she was rehoused on the 20th floor of a high rise block which seemed wonderful - at first. She felt it was sad that so much demolition had taken place instead of the tenements being rehabilitated. On her return she found that Plantation St. was covered with houses where the yuppies lived.
