## CHEMICALS IN THE ENVIRONMENT

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## Dr. ALAN TULLEY

Dr. Tulley, qualified as a Research Chemist and worked in the Glaxo Laboratories for 6 years; but for the past 20 years he has been with Kodak working in the fields of research, information, safety and environmental affairs. His talk will be about what chemicals are and the contribution of the chemical industry and and chemicals to the environment.

AERIAL ARCHAEOLOGY - On the 26th March Mr. Royden introduced his talk by explaining that aerial archaeology was a fairly new approach to the study of history, linked to the history of aviation and the development of photography.

In 1924 O.G.S. Crawford of Dorset. started taking pictures from the air. He had been in the R.F.C. during the first world war and it was then that he realised the potential of aerial views. Later he teamed up with J.K. St. Joseph and in 1945 the Cambridge University Unit was formed.

Where the soil has been deep-dug in the past for such things as ditches, building work, fish ponds, moats and quarries etc., crops today grow taller and are greener in colour than the surrounding area and the difference can be picked out in photographs taken at the right time of day and at the right time of year. This timing is of the greatest importance as a raking light will throw shadows revealing tell tale marks of what lies beneath the ground surface which can be seen in no other way.

We were then taken on a tour of England by slides to places where much has been learned through aerial pictures. We saw Avebury, Grassington near Bolton Abbey, Silchester where a Roman forum was excavated by Sir Mortimer Wheeler and Maiden Castle near Dorchester and Hod Hill, also in Dorset. where a Celtic Hill Fort had been reused by the Romans. During the 17th and 18th centuries much land was enclosed (for the benefit of the wealthy) replacing the open fields worked previously in strips, these strips can still be seen as ridge and furrow from the air. Lost villages, deserted often from the time of the Black Death, have now been found again - all, of course, backed up by documentary evidence.

After the tour we came nearer home and saw photographs from the air, taken by Mr. Royden, of Halewood and he pointed out roads which had been stopped up when their enclosures took place in 1803, Ditton Brook which had been straightened out by Lord Derby, the moated Lovells Hall, Yew Tree farm and the Old Hutte with its fish ponds and moat. A most interesting evening but sadly no photographs of Little Woolton, but Mr. Royden has promised some of Brettargh Holt and Lee Park in the future.
