

REPORT: BRIAN KING'S TALK ON

LIVERPOOL'S HISTORIC WATERFRONT.

Brian King, who is a Mersey Blue Badge Guide, gave a talk with slides on the 16th January, and despite a very cold night, a larger than usual number of people attended.

Brian gave us a history of the waterfront with maps showing original dock areas dating from 1650. The first dock was built in 1750 by Thomas Steers. This was a great success and afterwards came the Canning Salthouse, and this and other docks were built on reclaimed land. From the maps shown we were able to see the development of Liverpool as a busy port.

The Albert Dock was described in detail with a full historical background. The Albert Dock is the largest group of Grade 1 Listed Buildings in the country and the dock engineer, Jesse Hartley was in charge from 1824 to 1860. The Albert Dock itself was finished in 1846 and was the first fireproof commercial warehouse to be built in brick, iron and stone Through different slides various aspects of the dock were shown, which would not normally be noticed during a visit to the area. Many of the different buildings on the site which had various functions in the running of the port, but which now have different uses, were identified and described. Interesting architectural features such as the stone columns, roman numerals indicating depth of water and stone steps set on edge, gave us an insight into the variety of features that make this group of buildings one of the most popular tourist venues in the country.

Brian then talked about some of the great liners that berthed in Liverpool, and described how the sinking of the Titanic was announced in Liverpool As usual, after the talk, there was a question and answer session which further enlightened our knowledge of Liverpool and its port


