CELTIC ART: Our August meeting

On the 11th August Dorothy O'Hanlon gave us an enthralling talk on Celtic art. We were shown some beautiful slides of work from the Book of Kells and other examples of Celtic art. Dorothy helped us to understand and interpret some of the complex and intricate designs and colours in the pages of the Celtic Books. Other intriguing aspects of her talk were her references to the question of the authorship, place of origin and purpose of the Book of Kells. There is no complete agreement among scholars, but Dorothy modestly put forward her proposal of an Irish origin by virtue of the artistic exuberance. She also pointed out some of the 7th and 8th century influences on this art form through links with Europe and the Mediterranean world.

The talk was well attended by a very appreciative audience. We now look forward to a future evening when Dorothy will treat us to the fruits of her archaeological work and travels.

GRASS CUTTING

This is the City Council's reply to our complaint of poor grasscutting standards on local verges, etc.:

"Within the current ground maintenance contract ... the amount of times the grass should be cut is performance based rather than frequency based, i.e. in the summer when the height of grass is over 75mm it should be cut, this should equate to a cut every three weeks... If grass is cut regularly there is no necessity to remove grass arisings... Unfortunately, the contractor is currently experiencing difficulty in achieving a regular frequency of grass cutting due to their inability to complete maintenance schedules as per contractual specifications."

We

hope the Council will take steps to improve things next year.

LITTER BINS

The City Council's Environmental Maintenance manager has also responded to our request for replacement litter bins in Rose Brow, where litter and leaves seem to go unswept for weeks on end:

"Unfortunately budgetary constraints do not allow me to replace the damaged litter bins. However, I shall continue to monitor this area, and if I find it falls below an acceptable standard of cleanliness I will rectify this as soon as possible."
