FINDING OUT ABOUT FAMILY HISTORY

A talk by Adrian Wood



on Sunday 3rd December at 2.30 pm in Gateacre Chapel Hall, Sandfield Road, Liverpool L25

The recent recovery from Sweden of a tapestry (illustrated above) is the basis for this talk by Adrian Wood, who last came to speak to us about his researches almost 7 years ago.

Margaret Blackburne was born in 1846 at the butcher's business on the corner of Belle Vale Road and Halewood Road, a site now occupied by the undertaker's premises opposite the Black Bull. Her family background and life will be recounted but the theme of the talk will be how to trace family history using census details, church records and other possible sources of reference. The original tapestry, photographs and various parish records will be produced, and many questions are anticipated!

THE HISTORY AND WORK OF THE NSPCC

A Review of our May Talk - by Mary Champion

On Tuesday May 23rd we had an interesting talk by Hazel Russell and Caroline Walsh of the NSPCC.

Hazel spoke to us first and told us about the foundation in 1883 of the Liverpool Society for the Protection of Children - the first such charity in the country. Liverpool was a grim place for children and there were no laws to protect them. Thomas Agnew gathered rich colleagues to a meeting in the Town Hall and the Society was established. The next year a second society was founded in London, and soon became nationwide.

The world is still a dangerous place for children. In 2006 one in two of the children who die do so because of abuse. 32,700 children in the UK are on child protection registers. 25% of children have experienced some form of violence, and for 78% of these children this violence happens at home. Two key areas need to be enhanced: protecting children who are caught up in domestic violence and children who are born to mothers abusing drugs and alcohol. To help combat these issues the Liverpool NSPCC is building a new Centre - 'hug shaped' and child friendly - for which John Hargreaves of Matalan generously kick-started the appeal in 2004.

The new building will be the base for four key services: a greatly enhanced domestic violence team, a brand new service to young mothers abusing drugs, the investigation of cases of organised child abuse within the region, and an internet service where children can discuss their problems online with trained staff in total privacy. A site has been secured in Great Homer Street, building work will start in June and the Centre will open in April 2007.

Caroline Walsh - who, among other things, co-ordinates fundraising by small groups and helps with promoting events like the Big Bike Ride - then talked to us about the other work that is done by the NSPCC in Liverpool. Children who have witnessed violence are given counselling, as are the parents and grandparents. The service is to the whole family, the aim being to help people to change. The NSPCC also works in schools, the Women's Hospital and Styal Prison.

This was a worthwhile and thought-provoking evening.

WHERE HAVE ALL THE FLOWERS GONE ... ?

Many people have commented, with regret, on the empty and neglected planters in and around Gateacre village this summer. For a variety of personal reasons, the band of volunteers known as the Friends of Gateacre were unable to repeat last year's very successful efforts, and decided to take 'time out' prior to a re-launch in the autumn. MICHAEL TAYLOR GARAGE SITE -REVISED PLANS

Following the rejection by the City Council's planners of previous applications for a block of flats, Mr Taylor has now applied for permission (ref. 06F/2557) to build 7 town houses. The proposed houses are architect designed and, in our view, a great improvement on the previous submissions. We have written to the Planning Department reiterating our support for residential redevelopment of this unsightly garage site, and broadly welcoming the design, landscaping and materials of the latest proposal (see pictures above and below, kindly supplied by the architects, KDP of Liverpool). We remain concerned about the inadequacy of car parking provision - each of the new houses will have a single space, either in the front garden or alongside it but we recognise that it will be expensive to clear and decontaminate the petrol station site. We have asked the Council's planners to investigate whether these costs do indeed justify the number of houses proposed. We have also suggested a reorientation of the proposed Grange Lane frontage, so as to make the walls run parallel to the back-ofpavement line rather than at a slight angle as shown on the submitted layout plan.
