## RIDING FOR THE DISABLED IN LIVERPOOL

An illustrated talk by Jennifer Hoggarth on Tuesday 26th June, 8 pm, in Gateacre Chapel Hall, Sandfield Road L25



Jennifer Hoggarth is Chairperson for 'Friends of Beechley Stables' which is part of the Riding for the Disabled Association (RDA). In the words of one rider "I can only walk slowly now but on a horse I can fly!". Her talk will explain the many ways in which horse riding benefits disabled people, interspersed with anecdotes and experiences as a volunteer.

'Friends of Beechley Stables' was set up about two years ago to raise funds and public awareness of the facilities available in Harthill Road, Liverpool. Stable yard duties have expanded to include organising open days, promotional merchandise, photo shoots and publicity, as well as organising more rider activities and going to RDA competitions. Within one year Beechley was visited by 'the REAL Father Christmas', saw baby Jesus in a stable and Elvis enjoying a Summer Fair. In the words of one trustee "It makes you laugh, tugs your heart-strings and keeps you sane".

#### THE BELLE VALE PREFABS

Our February Talk - Reviewed by Mary Champion

On Sunday 4th February 2007, in the Gateacre Chapel Hall, we had a fascinating talk by Sandra Sandland about the Belle Vale Prefabs. Sandra was accompanied by a group of people who had lived in them too.

During the Blitz thousands of homes all over Britain were destroyed, and building new homes was an urgent priority. Four million homes were needed. On 26th March 1944 Winston Churchill announced that a Temporary Housing Programme was to be set up and that 160,000 prefabricated houses would be built all over the U.K. The programme began in Liverpool in 1946 with 3,500 units. The smallest was 2 houses in Lark Hill and the biggest was Belle Vale.

The Belle Vale houses were designed by aircraft engineers, and made up of four parts - bolted together on a brick base. They were made of aluminium, often constructed from aircraft shot down. They arrived from the factory on a lorry and it took about 30 to 40 man hours to erect each one. All the fittings and paint finishes were added prior to delivery.

1,159 prefabs were built on open farmland on each side of Childwall Valley Road in Belle Vale. Each one had two bedrooms, a living room, a fitted kitchen and bathroom, a fridge, cooker, ducted heating and indoor loo, plus a garden. Most luxurious compared with some of the homes destroyed.

The prefabs were intended to last for 10 years - but most of those at Belle Vale were up until 1969! A real community spirit grew up on the estate and eventually, when the time came to leave and move to other houses, people were broken-hearted. The estate was not houses in isolation. There were schools and churches and plenty of activities to lead a happy life, some specially built and some already in the area.


#### Advance Notice - GATEACRE MEMORIES - 14th September

#### **GOOD NEWS!**

We have just received a letter from the National Lottery to say that our 'Awards for All' grant application has been approved. We are being given £5,800 to spend on a project entitled 'Discovering and Learning About Gateacre's Past'.

The components of our project are:

- An information board on the village green.
- An archive of historic photographs and digital images using material contributed by local people.
- Illustrated talks on Gateacre's heritage, and workshops to encourage sharing of local knowledge and reminiscence.
- Worksheets for local schoolchildren to encourage observation and appreciation of our local heritage.
- A book of captioned photographs based on the historical archive assembled by the Society.

#### PLANNING UPDATE

#### **Gateacre Park Drive shops**

In our comments to the Council on the redevelopment plan, we expressed particular concern that the existing mix of shops and service uses within the centre should be retained. Outline planning permission was granted on 12th June, subject to a number of conditions. The main one is that the non-food portion of the scheme shall consist of a number of small units - which 'shall reflect the current uses in the centre' - rather than a single large store. The foodstore element shown on the original plan has been reduced in size, and will now be no bigger than the existing (though closed) KwikSave building.

#### **Gateacre Comp site, Grange Lane** In our comments to the Council on the outline housing plan, we suggested that the proposed 'amenity space' at the north end of the site which was stated as being for 'passive recreational use' only - should be integrated with and managed as part of the playing fields behind, and that a number of smaller amenity areas should be created within the housing development. This would have the dual benefit of allowing the preservation of some of the existing cherry trees, and reducing the overall number of new dwellings. We have also requested further consultation with local residents on the future use of the playing fields. A decision on the
